


MOVIE IN THE PARK

Along with my love of music came a love of teaching. What a great combination! I became involved with the child development center and discovered how music can be used to help children with special needs.



As Plato is quoted saying "Music gives a soul to the universe, wings to the mind, flight to the imagination and life to everything."

Music is an intrinsic part of the fabric of our society. It is important to our economy, communicates and influences the ideals of our culture and can shape our moral character. Listening to or playing music can have a soothing effect on our minds and is a great way to unwind after a long day at work or school.

Music is an important part of our education, More than just notes, rhythm and song, it completely transforms a child's mind and opens up endless possibilities of their learning potential.

Music stimulates the mathematical and language centers of the human brain and studies show that children benefit immensely when exposed to music at an early age. Animal & Bylaw Services wants to continue to foster its partnership with Calgarians to help keep our public and private spaces clean, safe and free of garbage and debris. With the recent devastation in many of our communities, it is clear that community spirit is a strong force in our city. We encourage all Calgarians to continue to contribute to their neighbourhoods by keeping their properties tidy, using proper receptacles to dispose of waste and picking up litter. Littering offences are covered under the **Street Bylaw (20M88)** and the **Parks and Pathways Bylaw (20M2003):**

- Litter or waste must not be left, or disposed of, except in receptacles provided for waste disposal
- No person shall dispose of litter or waste from a vehicle
- No person shall leave or dispose of litter or waste that is burning i.e. cigarettes

FINES

Littering: \$500.00

Littering from a vehicle: \$750.00 Disposing of burning litter: \$1,000.00

Burning litter, as we all know, can become a safety concern and any litter and waste, if not disposed of properly, can have a negative impact on our city. Thank you to all Calgarians for your continued hard work and the pride that you take in our city.

FISH CREEK SKILLS PARK

In partnership with Alberta Parks and the Friends of Fish Creek, the Calgary Mountain Bike Alliance will be developing the official Fish Creek Mountain Bike Skills Park over the next few years. By providing a progressive area designed for beginners to advance riders, we accomplish several important objectives:

- 1. Reducing the construction of unauthorized obstacles in the park, especially in areas like Mallard Point.
- 2. Providing a new family-friendly recreational area within Fish Creek Park.
- 3. Engaging local families and youth in the design, building and ongoing maintenance of the area.
- 4. Increasing public safety in Fish Creek for cyclists, pedestrians and all other park users.

THE FOUR MAIN AREAS THAT WILL BE BUILT:

1. Pump Track: An area of turns, bumps, rocks and other challenges for children and beginners to practice basic

riding skills. This area is planned to be completed this summer for a September opening.

- 2. Skills area (2014): This area will have larger rocks, logs and obstacles to practice and perfect beginner/intermediate riding skills.
- 3. Intermediate: An area that will include progressive jumps and tracks designer for more experience riders
- 4. Advanced (2015): This area will contain larger tracks and progressive jumps to challenge advanced riders

This will be the first facility of its kind in Calgary and will add to the infrastructure in Fish Creek Provincial Park. CMBA is committed to building a sustainable, natural area in keeping with the unique ecological environment within Fish Creek. 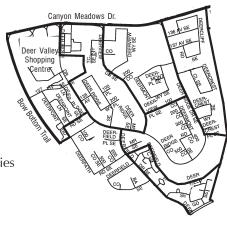

THE 52 MILLION DOLLAR QUESTION – AN UPDATE

I am sure most of you are now familiar with the issue of how to allocate the \$52 Million. On July 28, 2013 the issue came to a head when Council made its decision. There had originally been five options to choose from, but the 2013 Flood added another – to spend the \$52 million to rebuild and improve flood-damaged City infrastructure.

First, Council voted on whether or not to give the money back. I have advocated for giving the money back since day 1, and am the *ONLY alderman in the last three years that has voted consistently to NOT take this tax room.*

I voted to give the money back, but the majority of Council did not. The Mayor then asked Council to decide whether or not to use \$104 Million dollars of vacated tax (52 from 2013, and 52 from 2014) to go to flood mitigation.

I SECONDED AN AMENDMENT TO HIS PROPOSAL to exclude the 2014 amount, leaving the option to 'give it back' alive for next year. I voted to keep that option alive. The proposal with the amendment was passed. This chapter of the vacated provincial education tax is over, but there will be another.

Eligible electors will vote to elect their Mayor, Councillors and Public or Separate School Board Trustees on **Monday, October 21, 2013.**

You are eligible to vote if you:

- o Are at least 18 years old.
- o Are a Canadian citizen.
- o Have resided in Alberta since April 21, 2013.
- Are a resident on Election Day;
 - of the city of Calgary for Mayor, Councillor and;
 - of the Calgary Board of Education for Public School Board Trustee, or;
 - of the Calgary Roman Catholic Separate School District No. 1, for Separate School Trustee.
- Provide one of the authorized pieces of identification.

All eligible electors can vote at the Advance Vote, October 9 - 13 and October 15 - 16.

Blind voter templates are available at the Advance Vote only.

If you can't vote at the Advance Vote or on Election Day, request a Mail-in (Special) Ballot or, if housebound due to injury, illness or disability, a special service to vote at home can be requested.

A city of Calgary General Election brochure will be delivered to every household in early October.

Dogs, Ticks, And Lyme Disease

Ticks are a parasite that dogs and people acquire when they walk through the underbrush and the small insect attaches to the skin. Anyone hiking in Alberta wilderness should check themselves and their pets for ticks when they return home. Most tick species will only cause a local lesion but ticks can be carriers of other serious diseases such as Lyme disease and Rocky Mountain spotted fever. Lyme disease is a tick borne bacterial disease that causes debilitating illness in people, but only causes serious illness in ten percent of dogs. Veterinarians in Alberta submit ticks from small animals to Alberta Health Services for the tick surveillance project.

At this point in time the species of tick, Ixodes, which carries Lyme disease, is uncommon in Alberta, but very recently a tick from a dog did test positive for Lyme disease in Edmonton. The incidence of Lyme disease is increasing and spreading throughout Canada and the USA.

Lyme disease is caused by a bacterium borrelia burgdorferi carried by the tick and transmitted into the host through the tick's bite. It is suspected most infected ticks are carried into the province by migratory birds. In the normal life cycle of the lxodes tick, it attaches to multiple hosts. If the dog picks up the tick and comes into the house the risk is the tick will end up on the dog's human.

After being bitten, it can take weeks or months for dogs to develop symptoms of Lyme disease, and in most cases it is a minor infection. The more serious arthritic form of Lyme disease is rarer and is treated with appropriate antibiotics once diagnosed. Kidney damage is possible if smoldering latent infections go undiagnosed for a long period of time. Heart and neurological issues seen in people are exceedingly rare in dogs. Specific blood tests can be run to diagnose Lyme disease in dogs.

There are vaccinations available to prevent Lyme disease in dogs, but this does not prevent the tick from entering the household; few Alberta veterinarians chose this route of prevention. Most veterinarians recommend using tick repellents and anti-parasitics as the most effective means of disease prevention. Repellent products have advanced over the last few years and are not affected by dogs swimming as they once were. Some repellent products are extremely toxic to cats.

Some products will prevent Lyme disease by killing ticks or causing them to drop off within 48 hours preventing disease transmission. Flea and tick collars are also effective

in repelling ticks. Unfortunately, some tick species are becoming resistant to some products and a few excellent products advertised on Canadian television are only available in the USA.

Carefully remove any ticks found on your pet by grasping the head with tweezers and gently pulling without twisting, and wash the area with an antibacterial soap. Save the tick in a pill vial or double zip-lock bag. Add a small piece of moist towel to prevent the tick from drying out and submit to your veterinarian or an AHS Environmental Public Health Office for the surveillance program.

Lyme disease has only recently come to the attention of Albertans. Dogs, being dogs, running through the grasses and underbrush, will more readily pick up ticks than people. In Alberta, precautions recommended will depend on your particular pet's risk and if you are traveling to endemic areas. Consult your veterinarian.

Message from Heather Forsyth – M.L.A. Calgary Fish Creek

DISASTER 2013 – As we are all aware, the devastation of the June flooding will continue for a very long time. Folks in many of the areas are still somewhat uncertain of the coverage they will receive to either rebuild or relocate. With all of the heartbreak there are beacons of light with the thousands of volunteers helping total strangers try to get their lives back to some semblance of order. I'd like to repeat part of my August message: An excellent resource for what's needed and where, is: http://alberta.ca/how-you-can-help.cfm. As well our Calgary Food Bank has a website: www.calgaryfoodbank.com/ which may also be helpful. Speaking from my own experiences while volunteering at the Drop In Centre, and in High River, I can certainly attest to the extreme gratitude of those impacted by the true spirit of community residents.

NEW STANDARDS TO PROTECT HOMES & BUSINESSES ANNOUNCED. New minimum standards were introduced by the province July 28th for protecting homes and businesses in flood fringe zones.

Expected to add about 15% to the cost of mitigating each home, which government officials roughly estimate at around \$10,000 on average — the new standard calls for the use of water-resistant materials that can be cleaned easily. It also demands openings in basements for pipes and wiring be sealed.

Electric panels also have to be moved or modified so basement circuits that may be affected by flood water are isolated from the rest of the home or business.

Setting these measures today is the first step toward mitigating potential future damages by rebuilding safer homes and stronger communities.

A new funding formula based on square footage was also announced for homes needing to be rebuilt. Bungalow and bi-level home owners, for instance, will get \$126 per sq.-ft. for above grade work, \$25 per sq.-ft. for foundations and \$35 per sq.-ft. for basements. Adjustments will also be made for different communities to reflect the increased costs of labour and supplies.

"What this does is bring a level of fairness into the program as it will assess and calculate a home in Sunnyside, Calgary in the exact same manner as a home in Bragg Creek or High River. One size does not fit all circumstances and there will be some differences depending on the type of home and the level of finish in the basement.

Owners who access funding through the province's recovery program will have a notice attached to their land title, which will be stay until the work is complete and inspected.

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY



Alberta Health Services EMS would like to remind parents and students of some basic road safety tips as streets become busier with the return of the school year. Pedestrians and motorists each have an important role to play- road safety is a shared responsibility.

PEDESTRIANS

- Cross only at marked crosswalks or street corners that have clear visibility from all directions.
- Make eye contact with all drivers before crossing the street.
- When activating overhead crossing lights, pause before stepping off the curb to ensure motorists in both directions have come to a complete stop.

AROUND SCHOOL BUSES

- Flashing amber lights mean a bus is slowing down to stop. Motorists should do likewise.
- No matter which direction you are coming from, STOP when approaching a school bus with activated flashing red lights - unless the bus is on the opposite side of a divided highway from you.
- Driver courtesy goes a long way. By simply being alert and cautious when approaching a school bus, you are contributing to school bus safety.

MOTORISTS

- Avoid talking on cell phones, texting, or any other behavior that diverts your attention away from driving.
- Give right of way to pedestrians who have activated overhead crossing lights or who are waiting to cross from a street corner.
- Remember it is illegal to pass vehicles, other than those that are parked, in school zones or playground zones during posted hours.
- Stay within the crosswalk lines until fully clear of the road way.
- Obey pedestrian lights at intersections. Cross the street only when you see the 'walk' sign and only when all cars have come to a complete stop.
- If you are with young children or pets, hold your child's hand firmly and keep a solid grip on leashes when crossing.
- Remember: children learn by observing you. By teaching them safe crossing habits as early as possible you can reduce the chance your child may be involved in a preventable auto/pedestrian collision

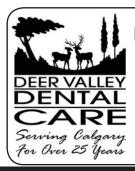
